

## **Morningside Cemetery**

The Morning Side Cemetery is home to many passed civil war veterans. This Cemetery also is a home for Almanzo Wilder's grandparents. One of the statues represents Fredrick Wead and his fight in the civil war. The morningside cemetery was built in 1810.

## **Elks Lodge**

The Elks Lodge was Vice President William Wheeler's house when he was Vice President. He lived there and only paid about \$5000 to get the property and to build it. He lived there for almost his entire life and did most of his work there after he left the White House. He spent most of his time in the elks lodge.
